2017 Speaker Series

This year we have another great slate of speakers lined up. These presentations start at 4:30 p.m. Doors open at 4:10 p.m. Come early—seating is limited.

The first presentation on May 18 promises to be a lively discussion led by Chip Griffin. Brian Barter and friends will share their experiences lobstering around Damariscove Island. The island, five miles from Boothbay Harbor, is one of Maine's earliest settlement sites dating back four centuries

Later in the summer, on August 10, Mike Dekker and Paul Diaute will delve into earlier years on Damariscove with a program on cod fishing in the 17th century.

On September 28, we focus on a broader picture of the Atlantic Ocean. Bill Wilson will present a program based on his many years of research into the *Titanic* disaster.



Lost at Sea Exhibit



Come experience the incredible stories of local men and young boys who gave their lives for a life at sea during the 19th century.

perils of dory fishing on the Banks off the Canadian Maritimes or being struck by a hurricane in the West Indies. Another story relates the fate of a captain whose crew mutinied.

Discover how lives lost at sea touched so many families in the Boothbay area. Often times, they had more than one family member who never returned home. Read the list of men who were lost, and also a list of young boys who worked on the vessels, some as young as eight or nine years old. George G. Emerson, for example, was 14 when he went on his first voyage in 1859. In

letters to his mother and sister, he described his homesickness and longing to be home celebrating special events such as the 4th of July with them. Having lost a brother already to the sea, he was reluctant to go at all, but did. Then, having sailed around the world, he succumbed to the same fate in 1865. His mother, fearing the worst, waited for word to arrive, and finally got the news she had been dreading.

Just as George Emerson's mother mourned, Nicholas T. Knight knew that same feeling. He had lost several sons. Then one night in 1839 he had a dream that yet another son had been lost in the Maritimes. He awoke the next morning so fearful that he told a neighbor his nightmare, which turned out to be real. For many years the location of the tragedy was unknown. Then, some 20 years later a fisherman visited the area where Knight's son was known to have fished. He heard a story from a local who saw

the wreck. John Knight had been 17 years old at his 1839 death.

An 1851 story describes 13 Boothbay men who anxiously awaited the launching of the new vessel, G. W. Reed. They had plans to go fishing in the Bay of St. Lawrence. However, while at the launching they saw how she rolled, an unlucky sign, and all agreed they would not be comfortable taking her so far from home. So they signed up to take the C. G. Matthews instead. While there fishing, a hurricane arose that later became known as the "storm of the century." Vessels fishing the entire length of the east coast felt its wrath. Later, families found out that the C. G. Matthews was lost with all hands. The G. W. Reed came back to the harbor safe and sound. A monument now stands at the Wylie Cemetery in Boothbay, erected in their honor.
