#### **Barters Island School**

Many may remember Betty Pinkham, who was born in 1912, died in 1999, and worked for many years at Logan's Village Store. In 1992 she gave me this photo of the Barters Island school as it appeared in the late 1890s when her father Stephen Pinkham taught there—she suspected 1898. Stephen, on the far right, was a Barters Islander born in 1878 and with an unusual future. He went on to Bowdoin College at a time when few local people went through high school and a rare few obtained advanced schooling, then to Western Electric, and finally he rose high in Remington Rand until his premature death in 1936.

The schoolhouse was built in 1892 by carpenters Paul and George Giles, replacing an older, smaller one built in 1825. I don't think I ever knew what happened to the old school; usually they were sold and often moved elsewhere. This lower island school in school district #13 covered all grades including, for a while, a two-year high school. The Barters Island school district was created in 1817, before which the island was part of the Back River school district. A district #13 division came in 1837, when school district #11 was formed on the upper part of the island. I've written quite a bit about the upper island school. District numbers were abolished by state decree in 1892, but the old familiar numbers hung on.

In 1992 I talked to Floyd Pinkham, who lived on the upper west side of the island. Among other topics, he helped me identify a few features in this photo. He told me the barn on the left was John Dunton's and near the property owned by Joel Lewis in 1992. Floyd also said that the ledges above the barn and to the right were traditionally called "Stover's Ledges." I decided to confirm Stephen Pinkham's teaching years at school #13 by consulting Boothbay town reports. They are a wonderful source of information about the pre-modern era since they list every person or entity paid by the town. (Pre-modern is before the 1950s by my personal quirky standard—the introduction of town managers seems to have brought with it a more antiseptic and business-school flavor to town affairs and accounts). Between 1895 and 1914 Stephen was paid to teach at the lower Barters Island school only in 1896 and 1898, which matched Betty's statement. Probably the horse and carriage belong to the photographer. You know how tall many island Lewises have been and are? Maybe the tall barefoot boys on the right are Lewises.
