



A Look Back: 150 Years in Boothbay Harbor

Presented by Robert Mitchell


Thursday, June 27, 2024 at 4:30pm 72 Oak Street, Boothbay Harbor, ME

In the first talk of our 2024 Summer Speaker Series, Robert Mitchell will discuss Boothbay Harbor from 1874 to today in, *A Look Back: 150 Years in Boothbay Harbor.* Using historic photos of the area from his own collections and Boothbay Region Historical Society, Robert will make the past of our vibrant community come alive. Discussing buildings, businesses, and events of times gone by, he'll reveal what has changed but also what has stayed the same and continues to define the town we love.

This talk compliments our 2024 exhibit, opening this summer, celebrating the birth of Elizabeth Freeman Reed (1874-1953) and the construction of her childhood home at 72 Oak Street, where our museum is now housed. Robert's talk will put the house's construction and Elizabeth's birth into context with local history. The exhibit builds on this, adding regional, national, and global context to help connect the Boothbay region to the wider world.



Elizabeth Reed's Magnanimous Gift

Looking back one hundred and fifty years to 1874, the birth of Elizabeth Freeman Reed stands out as a significant event in the history of the region and of the current home of the Boothbay Region Historical Society. The opening lines of the Dedication Address of the Monday Club, written and delivered on February 22, 1960, by Mrs. George F. Carlisle read, "This afternoon we are commemorating the 65th anniversary of the Monday Club, paying tribute to Miss Elizabeth Freeman Reed and dedicating this attractive home she bequeathed to the Monday Club."

Captain Freeman Kennedy Reed (1841-1889) and Elizabeth Fisher Blair (1840-1874) married in 1867. When they moved into their newly built Oak Street home in 1874 they already had two young children, Fullerton Paul (1870-1949) and Kate Leslie (1872-1927). Elizabeth Freeman Reed was born on December 12, 1874. Tragically, her mother died two weeks later, leaving the captain with three young children. When their father was at sea, friends and relatives cared for the three Reed children, who attended local schools and on occasion accompanied their father on his schooner, the *James S. Lowell*.

After Elizabeth, also known as Bess, graduated from Lincoln Academy and entered Mount Holyoke College in 1892. Her extensive life accomplishments in Boston, New York, and Boothbay Harbor are described in detail in the four-page Dedication Address. In the 1940s when Bess Reed was most active in the

Monday Club, as Vice President in 1942-43 and President in 1943-44, members did not want to deplete their treasury to purchase land for a club house. Bess made plans at a meeting with several members to offer the Monday Club the Oak Street home in which she had spent so much of her life. Bess died on January 30, 1953, with the first meeting of the Monday Club convening in their new club house on December 6, 1954.

The dedication continues, "In memory of Miss Elizabeth Freeman Reed and her magnanimous gift of remembrance to the Monday Club, we dedicate the house with love, affection and appreciation. We are grateful for the confidence she has placed in us. Pleasant memories of her friendship, comradeship, and leadership still abide with us." The benediction reads: (Note that I have added [s] to better reflect the members of the Monday Club.)

"May everyone who comes within this house be stronger.

Richer, better, happier, the longer [s]he remain,

Counting life more worth living,

Friendship more worth the giving,

Then again, remembering, gladly how [s]he dwelt here,

When [s]he parts, may [s]he leave sweet thoughts behind [her]him,

Memories that e'er will bind [her]him,

In our hearts.

Amen:"
